#### **Native Plants**

#### Tall Meadow Rue - thalictrum pubescens

There are 3 Meadow Rues native to Ontario: Tall, early and purple meadow rue. Also there are many cultivars under the name Thalictrum - some are real beauties.



Tall Meadow Rue, also called King of the Meadow, grows around 5ft tall, in sun or part shade, at the edge of woods or in meadows. They like moist soil so if growing in full sun they need frequent watering. The leaves are small, blue-green in colour and they look similar to columbine leaves. The flowers are feathery clusters of

numerous white stamens and they bloom from June through August.

I like them because they rise above most other perennials and are delicate and willowy and a slight breeze will flutter the leaves, just like trembling aspen. They will self seed in the vicinity so you tend to get a clump of them but they can divide quite easily.

#### Premiums 2024

We hope you are enjoying the new premiums in your garden. The heat and moisture are perfect for rapid growth, so be sure to keep your new plants well-watered.

We selected the premiums for various growing conditions. The Melittis thrives in part sun/part shade and is a very unusual and fragrant plant. The hardy "Minuteman" hosta has pure white and green leaves and thrives in shade. The "Caramel" heuchera is a popular and hardy plant. It is low maintenance and has large showy leaves that stand out in the garden. Pollinators love the "Rose Marvel" pink salvia. It is a fragrant plant which is also mildew resistant and has a long blooming time.

We want to extend a special thank you to Christina Anonychuk who helped pick up the premiums and distribute them at the meeting.

# Melittis melissophyllum "Royal Velvet Distinction"

- partial sun/shade; H 35cm W 35cm
- fragrant, bi-coloured, orchid like flower
- attracts pollinators in late spring

#### Salvia nemorosa "Rose Marvel"

full sun - H 30cm W 30cm
 attracts butterflies, deer & rabbit resistant
 rich pink blooms; mildew resistant foliage
 fragrant, long blooming, good in rock gardens





#### Heuchera "Caramel"

- low maintenance, tolerant of salt
- H 30cm W 40cm
- pale pink flowers late spring to summer
- apricot to caramel coloured foliage

# Hosta, "Minuteman"

- low maintenance H 55cm W 125 cm
  - partial sun/shade to full shade
- lavender coloured flowers in summer
  - slightly rippled variegated leaves



# **May Flower Show**

We enjoyed the experience as Flower Show Clerks and learned a lot from the Judge, Kathy Faber Rowlands. With flashlight in hand, she pointed out how she graded each entry. Kathy was impressed with the entries and commented that everyone turned in good specimens. She challenged everyone to bring at least one entry to the next flower show. Kathy suggested that in preparation for entering specimens to cut the foliage and flowers the night before the show or in the early morning and store them in a cool dark place. To keep tulips from drooping, she suggested inserting a pin through the stem, just below the flower. The pin should be removed before the show.

#### **2024 Plant Sale Review**

At 6.30 am on Saturday May the 25<sup>th</sup> 2024, potted plants started arriving at the Leslie Log House delivered by 18 SHS members. Some of these people had volunteered to pick up plants and deliver them to the Leslie Log House.

I would especially like to thank these members Rosemarie Bera, Carol Zarb, Marcia Spear, Bev Cay and Jill Davies. They were not part of the group who had originally volunteered to transport plants, but all agreed to help out when it became obvious that we didn't have enough people and cars to move all the plants.

Almost 1400 plants were delivered and set up on the sales field by a team of about 20 people. Many, many customers were lined up at 8.30 am. Many plants were sold, the draw table run by Judy Castellino was very popular. Grace McElhinney organized the garage sale tables, plus painted and decorated several chairs, that had cutouts in the seats for the planted pots which were included.

On Friday the weather forecast was for rain to start on Saturday at about 1pm. By Saturday morning that forecast had changed and by 10am we were all getting wet. By 11.30 it was still raining, and we decided to end the sale early.

We usually put the plants on Buy 1 get 1 free sale about 1pm, this year that happened at 12 noon. By 12.30 it was definitely time to end the sale early, all the remaining plants were moved to the raised bed area behind the shed. These plants are available for sale on Wednesday mornings at the Leslie Log House. All plants are now \$2 each. The plants include irises, Solomon seal, Rose Campion, columbine and many other varieties. I will send the complete list of the plants available on Wednesday.

If you, a friend or a neighbour would like to buy plants, please drop by any Wednesday morning and bring cash, small bills would be great.

There are many members to thank for their contributions of time to our Plant Sale. The people who worked at the sale, the many people who donated plants, spent their time potting plants, digging up plants for people who couldn't, caring for plants before the sale, and transporting plants from the plant sitters to the Leslie Log House at between 6.30 and 7am on May 25th.

These members donated their time making snacks for the hungry workers, Rosemarie Bera, Cathy Clipperton, Lorena D'Arsie, Maureen Dodd, Nury Garzon, Sue Harshman, Anita King, Judi Kokis, Marcia Spear and Martha Witney. Shirley Boyes brought her beautifully painted signs. Mary Ann Brown deposited \$6931.70 to our bank account on Saturday afternoon.

We ordered annuals from Zomer's wholesale nursery, including cell pack annuals and 4 inch pot annuals, 2 varieties of the 4 inch pot annuals were not available, Zomers donated 6 flats of other 4 inch pot annuals. We received donations from several local businesses, including those listed by Grace Nelham.

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Additional thanks go to Ross & Sarah Pengilley who again let us use their property to pot up plants, plus Sarah's donation of many plants from her garden. Many thanks to each and everyone who helped and volunteered, I can't name all those who helped make the Plant Sale a soggy success, but you know who you are, and thank you all so much.

Rebekah Churchyard, BA, BSW, MSW, RSW, PMP is a Registered Social Worker, Project Management Professional, and Psychotherapist specialized in geriatrics and dementia care. She is the CEO and Founder of Green Care Farms Inc., the first nature-based program in Canada for people with dementia on an operational farm. She also works full-time in Specialized Geriatric Services for Home and Community Care Support Services Waterloo Wellington. Prior to this, Rebekah served as President and Vice-President with the Toronto Council on Aging Board of Directors and as an Accountability Table member with the City of Toronto's Seniors Strategy.
